10:45 a.m. Session 1: Conference Board of Canada Cyber Security Review

The 2021 Cyber Review surveyed IT leaders, executives, and consumers to learn about how they were responding and adapting to new security and risk challenges brought on by the COVID 19 Pandemic. The surveys spanned three general themes: 1. The supply side, examining the pandemic's effect on organizations' operations regarding cybersecurity, new technologies, and risk, 2. The demand side, examining the pandemic's effect on how consumers feel about cybersecurity, new technologies, and their own tech usage in light of the "new normal," 3. Policies, examining the pandemic's effect on corporate and public policy for privacy, cybersecurity, and new technologies. The aim of the research is to help leaders in the private and public sector learn about how their peers have managed privacy, digital security, and new technologies throughout the pandemic, and inform decisions as we emerge into the post-pandemic world.

Defense contractors and critical Infrastructure are a primary target of advanced adversaries. Traditionally we think of these adversaries launching technical attacks geared to exploit holes in our security perimeter with the goal of stealing sensitive information for strategic or economical gain. As the pandemic forced a largely remote workforce, the network borders expanded outside the company walls which introduced numerous challenges to security teams. The home network as a realistic attack vector for the adversaries to exploit. What does this mean to an insider threat program?
